## Waiver Notice

Pursuant to section 319 of the PHS Act, Secretary Azar determined that, as the result of the consequences of opioid epidemic, a PHE has existed in the nation since October 26, 2017. The Secretary's determination to declare the PHE was made after consultation with public health officials as necessary. As result of the PHE, the Secretary also determined pursuant to section 319(f) of the PHS Act that circumstances of the PHE necessitate a waiver from the requirements of the Paperwork Reduction Act, 44 U.S.C. § 3501 *et seq.*, effective as of the date of this notice. The waiver is justified to collect information to support the Department's investigation of and response to opioid epidemic. This waiver applies to information being collected from physicians and other qualified practitioners who provide medication-assisted treatment for opioid use disorder.

Pursuant to the waiver, the requirements of 44 U.S.C. § 3501 *et seq.* shall not be applicable with respect to voluntary collection of information during the effective time period.

The Paperwork Reduction Act waiver is effective as of August 21, 2019 and is anticipated to remain in effect for 30 days.

Any initiative subject to this waiver that is ongoing after the termination of the effective period shall be subject to the requirements of the Paperwork Reduction Act within 30 days of expiration of the waiver. The waiver applies to the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration.

This notice will be updated as needed.

## Addendum

This Paperwork Reduction Act waiver for the opioid epidemic is terminated effective February 11, 2020.
